## WHAT TO DRINK WITH DRUGS

UOAA Update 06/2014

How many times have you received a prescription with the instructions to "take as needed" or "take before meals"? Pretty vague, but many people do not stop to question further, assuming the medication will work, no matter what they swallow it with.

Acidic drinks, such as fruit juice or soda pop, may chemically destroy certain kinds of antibiotics, including penicillin, ampicillin or erythromycin. Citrus fruit juices may reduce the effect of antidepressants, antihistamines or major tranquilizers by speeding their urinary excretion.

Milk can interfere with a number of medicines. The laxative Ducolax, for example, has a coating designed to ensure that the drug will dissolve slowly within the intestine. But if the medication is taken with milk, which is alkaline, it may dissolve prematurely within the stomach, lose its cathartic action and irritate the sensitive stomach lining. Milk can also block the action of tetracycline. If a doctor fails to warn his or her patient not to take this antibiotic within an hour of any dairy product, he or she might be puzzled to hear the infection being treated has not disappeared.

Even something as simple as tea, hot or cold, may cause problems. A woman given a mineral supplement to treat iron-deficiency anemia would probably be surprised to learn that the tannin in tea can undo the benefits of her iron pills.

To play it safe, you can always rely on GOOD OLD WATER!! Water will not interact with drugs or reduce their effectiveness.



#### Continuing Your Social Life with an Ostomy UOAA UPDATE 6/2014

Your social life can be as active as it was before surgery. You can enjoy all activities: meeting people, attending concerts, sporting events, civic and social club meetings, parties, religious occasions or whatever you enjoyed before. The first time you go out of the house after surgery, you may feel as if everyone is staring at your pouch, even though it is not visible under your clothing. You can feel your pouch on your body, but no one can see it. Keep those concerns in mind. Did you know what an ostomy was or where a stoma was located or what it looked like before you had surgery?

You may also worry about your pouch filling with gas and sticking out under your clothing. A quick trip to the restroom can take care of this problem. If you are worried about your pouch filling up immediately after eating at a social event, remember, people without ostomies often need to go to the restroom after eating and nobody will think it is unusual if you do the same! You will probably find that you need to empty your pouch less often than you need to urinate.

Friendship and love - You may be wondering about your relationship with others. Now that you have an ostomy, you may feel that it will change your present relationships and decrease new opportunities for friendship and love. True friendships and deep relationships on any level are built on trust and mutual understanding. These qualities depend on you and other persons. You have the same qualities you had before surgery and your ability to develop friendships is unchanged. If you care about yourself, others will feel your strength and will not be deterred. If your ostomy does cause a break in friendship, or relationship or even marriage, this relationship was not built upon trust and mutual respect and probably would have crumbled sometime in the future anyway.



## The Club

When you became an ostomate you joined a club- people living with ostomies. Within the ostomy club are sub divisions- colostomates, ileostomates, urostomates. People who have fecal diversions, people who have urinary diversions, colostomates who irrigate, colostomates who don't, people who use 2 piece systems, people who use 1 piece, people who use Hollister products people who don't, people who had continent diversions and then had ileostomies, people who have been reconnected and people who cannot, people who had multiple surgeries and problems, people who did not, people with major pouching problems people with only minor pouching problems.

Why do you have an ostomy? There are groups of people who have an ostomy because of cancer, or inflammatory bowel disease, or diverticulitis or C diff infection or trauma. There are ostomates who are at peace with their ostomy, people who are angry with it, people who are scared of it, people who are ignoring it, people who are counting the days until it goes away, people who wish it would go away.

And then there is the ostomate support group club- spouses, partners, friends and family who have gathered to help. Who knew when you joined this club there were so many ways of

## The Value of an Ostomy Visitor

There are times when a certain person can make a difference that no one else can make... so it is with the ostomy visitor. You help someone at a time when they are vulnerable. They in turn might be the visitors of the future. Do you remember your ostomy visitor? Just when you thought you couldn't possibly deal with the operation.. A friendly face at your hospital door (or home). This person assured you that he or she had once been the patient in the bed. They could also empathize with your aches and pains, depression and your fear for the future.

You can reflect back on your questions when you first had surgery. Am I still lovable? Won't my pouch leak at an embarrassing moment? How well you remember these feelings. The visitor somehow made you feel loveable. The idea dawned that if he or she could make it, you would too. The possibility of participating in your own ostomy care didn't seem quite so overwhelming. Perhaps you could start learning... one small step at a time. You are living proof that life goes on. You are there doing the very thing that the new patient wonders about. You are indeed a symbol of hope in the midst of their pain, confusion and fear.

Making a visit can seem like a small thing to you. It is like lighting a candle in the midst of darkness. It is helping them to help themselves. Not everyone is blessed with an ostomy visitor so they struggle to find the answers. A visitor can make all the difference.

Our ostomy support group has trained visitor men and women of all types of ostomies. Sadly they are seldom called upon anymore due in part to the hospital privacy rules (HIPPA); and in part to other factors such as depression and persons feeling all alone and not feeling sociable; and, in another large part, due to the hospital stay often being so short that there is no time for a visit.

Support groups seem to be the main person to person help systems now. We *need to be ambassadors* for our support group whenever we visit our hospitals or clinics for gastrointestinal or urinary follow ups. We can obtain our brochures and bring them over to those places and ask that they be given out. If we do the *advocating*, hopefully, less people will "fall through the cracks".
